It is vital that all students, staff, parents and community members maintain a heightened awareness of any strangers at, around or near any of our schools, and suspicious individuals or vehicles should be reported immediately to school administration or law enforcement.  The District is considering uniforms to identify staff members who work in maintenance, grounds, and custodial departments.
