						 The recommendation is to move forward with the design and construction of the new Columbine Elementary school. Tim Mills gave background information on the process leading to the recommendation; the process included input from the Long Range Planning Committee, the Blythe Project Team, and a committee led by Tom Parrish, Executive Director of the East Valley K-8 Schools. The plan to build a new school, to consolidate both Columbine and Lincoln Park Elementary Schools, will not be an additional cost to the taxpayers. The design will be a model for building standards for future school construction. In adopting Business Item K-5, the Board will be moving forward with a school design to reflect the sustainable guidelines for a high-performance, energy efficient facility. Tim Mills provided the following information regarding a general time-line: An action plan will be developed to engage parents and community members in discussions to provide input into the construction planning. We can anticipate the school design to be in place in late summer, breaking ground in the fall, with the new school being ready to open in the fall of 2008. The construction of the building will take place while students are attending classes in the old Columbine building. A process which was successfully done for the new Bookcliff Middle School. Security and safety issues are being analyzed. The Lincoln Park Elementary building will remain as a viable school facility. Options to utilize the site will be discussed and brought forward next month. Dan Robinson expressed appreciation for a new school in the City of Grand Junction; an investment in the down-town area which will demonstrate that the inner city is not being neglected. No						 K-7. Amendment to Graduation Requirements, Board Policy IKF, 1st Reading [Draft Resolution 06/07:86] Board members discussed legislation that may affect Board Policy IKF. Leslie Kiesler indicated there is nothing at this point that should change the amendment as presented. Tim Mills noted some of the provisions in House Bill 1118, regarding graduation requirements, state-wide. The Governor will appoint a committee to work on graduation requirements on a state-wide basis. School boards will need to meet or exceed those requirements. District 51 has the highest number of credits for any school district in Colorado; therefore, Tim does not foresee an increase in graduation credits due to legislation; however, an adjustment may be necessary. A committee is in progress, studying the options for foreign language. Career Technical Education (CTE) Courses would be proposed as an option for students taking a vocational path. Cathie Gonzales, who heads up the Foreign Language Committee, gave an update on the progress of the Committee. Board members discussed alternative ways to acquire foreign language proficiency, such as correspondence programs with a university, online study, language labs and other models of learning. Also discussed was providing foreign language instruction to young children at elementary and middle school. 	1st Reading Information

The Colorado Commission on Higher Education (CCHE) requirements for 2 years of foreign language will go into affect for students graduating in the class of 2010; a requirement for students attending college in Colorado. The Foreign Language Committee will present a report to the Board at an upcoming meeting. Tim Mills summarized the discussion by stating the Board has a strong interest in this area. Work will need to be finalized to address how we accomplish this requirement and to identify the impacts. We need to look at alternative ways to deliver foreign language instruction, and in the future look at moving these concepts to an earlier age. Dan Robinson commented these courses could be offered through extended year opportunities in the summer, to provide more choice. Tim Mills asked if the Board would like the resolution revised to include the 2 credits for foreign language or career technical education. Board members indicated favoring the change to be brought back for adoption in May. K-8. Sustainable School Guidelines [Resolution 06/07:89] Dan Robinson emphasized the importance of the guidelines which reflect a statement of the Board's position. Ron Rowley supports standards that are at the highest level of efficiency, and emphasized the fiscal responsibility to taxpayers now and in the future. 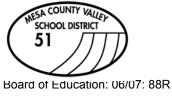

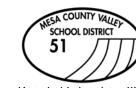

Related: JJE-R Adopted: June 13, 1972 Policy Manual Review: August 6, 2002 Re-adopted: April 17, 2007

Activities to raise funds for groups and organizations within the school or for support of activities involving students must receive the approval of the principal before they are begun. Proposals for raising funds shall contain information stating the approximate amount of money to be raised, the method by which it will be raised and the purpose for which it will be spent.

Orders for merchandise to be sold by students to raise funds must be signed by the principal. The school district will accept no liability for merchandise which is not so ordered.

No fund-raising activities shall be permitted that are in violation of the law.



Mesa County Valley School District 51 JJE-R STUDENT FUND-RAISING ACTIVITIES

Related: JJE Adopted: December 1, 1977 Revised to Conform with Practice: Date of Manual Adoption Policy Manual Review: August 6, 2002 Re-Adopted: April 17, 2007

Clubs, organizations or other school-associated groups may conduct fund-raising activities in accordance with the accompanying policy. The following principles shall be followed:

- 1. All fund-making activities must have prior approval by the building administration.
- 2. No sponsor or teacher shall become involved in soliciting student, community or parental support for trips or activities unless the trips or activities have had the prior approval of the principal.
- 3. All proposals for raising funds shall contain information stating the approximate amount of money to be raised, the method by which it will be raised and the purpose for which the funds will be spent.
- 4. If the proposed activity is not school-sponsored (such as vacation trips), all materials shall contain an appropriate disclaimer of school responsibility or liability.



Mesa County Valley School District 51 JJF STUDENT ACTIVITIES FUNDS MANAGEMENT

Related: JJF-R Adopted: January 19, 1993 Presented for Revision: August 6, 2002 Re-Adopted: April 17, 2007

Student activity funds may be raised and spent to promote the general welfare, education and morale of all students and shall finance authorized activities of student organizations, or for the support of activities involving students, and activities of the school district.

Student activity funds are considered a part of the total fiscal operation of the school district and, therefore, are subject to the policies and regulations established by the Board of Education and the office of the superintendent. The funds shall be managed in accordance with sound business practices—including sound budgetary and accounting procedures as well as audits—in the same manner as regular district funds. All funds received and/or disbursed by any agency of the school district for student activities must be accounted for through the accounts established for this purpose.

Student activity funds are to be used to finance a program of authorized school activities which may augment but not replace the activities financed by the district or for support of activities involving students. Funds derived from the student body as a whole shall be so expended as to benefit the student body as a whole, and the student body shall be represented in the democratic management of those funds raised by students and expended for their benefit. Funds derived from authorized clubs and organizations or for support of activities involving students shall be expended to benefit the specific club, organization or activity and, insofar as possible, to benefit those students currently in school who have contributed to the accumulation of these funds.

Activity fund-raising shall be conducted in such a manner as to offer minimum competition to commercial concerns while still benefiting the student body as a whole.

Authorized clubs and organizations or for support of activities involving students within the schools may use district facilities and equipment for fund-raising if such use does not create an additional cost to the district. If additional cost is incurred, the club or organization shall pay such cost.

By law, Student Body Activity (SBA) funds are the responsibility of the Board of Education and must be accounted for as prescribed by law and Board policy.

Accounts

Schools may develop accounts for various clubs, organizations, functions necessary for each school, and for support of activities involving students. The establishment or elimination of accounts shall be approved by the building administration. The responsibility for the management of SBA accounts shall rest with the principal but may be delegated to an official representative who is a staff member.

Fund Expenditures

Requests for expenditures of funds from SBA accounts must be made through the building principal or his delegated representative by the sponsor of each activity. No expenditures for student activities may be made without previous signed authorization of the principal or his delegated representative. Expenditures should be made in accordance with the guidelines established for that purpose.

Fund Accounting

Once each month during the school year each school maintaining SBA accounts shall publish a report concerning the status of each fund. A copy of the report is to be submitted to the central administration finance office. The status will include the beginning balance from the previous report, total cash expenditures from the fund and the balance of the fund.

Accounting Guidelines

The *Student Body Activity Accounting Procedures Handbook*, as periodically amended, is incorporated and made a part of this regulation.
