As local property taxes increase, state funding decreases. District 51 Per Pupil Funding vs. State Funding Levels: Historical Funding Per Pupil; Per Pupil Funding Largest Colorado Districts; Difference in Per Pupil Funding Largest Colorado Districts: Denver Public Schools receive \$800 more per student and Cherry Creek \$300 more per student than Mesa County District 51. The resolution, at a minimum shall specify the amount of the beginning fund balance to be spent under the school district budget, state the purpose for which the expenditure is needed, and state the school district's plan to ensure that the use of the beginning fund balance will not lead to an ongoing deficit." and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has set October 21, 2008, as the date of re-adoption for the 2008-2009 budgets for Mesa County Valley School District 51; and

WHEREAS, the Board may adopt the budgets at any regular or special meeting on or before, January 31, 2009;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of Mesa County Valley School District 51 does hereby approve the usage of the beginning fund balances as specified in the plan below for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2008, and ending on June 30, 2009.
