Audit Report: Mike Nelson, Nancy Paregien, and Sylvia Diebold Nancy Paregien introduced Mike Nelson of Chadwick, Steinkirchner, Davis, and Company PC, and Sylvia Diebold, District staff member who trains school secretaries at 40 sites to work with Student Body Account (SBA) transactions. Mike Nelson commended the District for establishing the Audit Committee, which has been in place for several years, and thanked Mrs. Kiesler and Mr. Rowley for serving on that committee. Mike Nelson reviewed the report with the Board, directing them to specific pages. His report included the following areas: federal funds, financial statements, accrual of salaries and benefits, net assets, liabilities, expenditures, SBA accounts, debt service, capital reserves, and bond accounts. Several commendations were noted: Having a separate committee to monitor the bond proceeds; the funds were spent appropriately. The Student Body Accounts were found to have no deficiencies. Sylvia Diebold and the school secretaries were thanked for their work in this accomplishment. The District's financial position is strong and continues to improve. Other areas for discussion included enrollment increases, the District's Finance Department for their work in this area. Dr. Mills thanked the Board for their continued work with the budget and for establishing annual budget parameters. H-3. School Calendar: Steve Schultz Copies of the proposed 2008-2009 and the 2009-2010 traditional calendars were provided to the Board. The proposed calendars are built from the 2007-2008 calendar template. Mr. Schultz pointed out several of the calendar features, which included: balanced semesters, ending the first semester before winter break, aligning spring break with Mesa State, maximizing instructional time before the testing window, and maintaining days to meet state requirements. The Future Farmers of America at Fruita Monument High School received a Gold Award in the National FFA Agricultural Mechanics Career Development Event at the 80th National FFA Convention. The team members are Dewey Johnston, Carson Pearson, Scott Meyers and Justin Grant.

In order to compete at the national level, the team first had to win the same event at the District and State levels. They placed first at both of these levels and in the top 14 of 47 teams attending the national competition.

Justin Grant and Dewey Johnston also took home individual gold awards with Carson Pearson and Scott Meyers achieving individual silvers in their areas. Dewey is also the national champion in Machinery and Equipment systems.

The top eleven individuals and the national winning team members receive scholarships to further their education at a post-secondary institution of their choice. The Board of Education is proud of all of these students and would like to extend its congratulations on doing so well in FFA competitions.

Recognition: Perfect ACT score Caleb Jordan, Grand Junction High School Junior

The Board of Education would like to recognize and congratulate Caleb Jordan, a junior at Grand Junction High School, for scoring perfect on the ACT in 2007. Caleb is one of only 24 students in the state of Colorado to score perfectly this year.

While Caleb will be the first to admit that part of any test score is luck, he credits his teachers and his education for being the biggest factors in preparing him for taking the ACT test. Amazingly, Caleb didn't do anything special to prep for this test besides study, normal coursework, and just working hard each day in the classroom to retain the knowledge he was taught.

Caleb is planning on applying to attend MIT, Stanford, Harvey Mudd or another math and science school to pursue a degree in Materials Technology (nanotechnology). He then plans to go on to Advance Human Technology.

Caleb and his fellow achievers were honored by the Colorado Board of Education and College in Colorado in November. The 24 perfect scores is a record, according to Assistant Commissioner Jo O'Brien, who heads the office of standards and assessments. Last year, there were seven perfect scores and in 2005 there were 17. A perfect score is extraordinary—only one in every 5,500 students nationally will reach that level. These 24 students, including Caleb, certainly deserve to be recognized as terrific examples of what Colorado can achieve.

The ACT assesses high school students' general educational development and their ability to complete college-level work. In Colorado, all juniors in high school are required to take the ACT as part of the state accountability system. Last year, just over 50,000 students in Colorado took the ACT.

Energy Management Program

Board of Education Resolution 07/08-37

Adopted: December 18, 2007

WHEREAS, the Board of Education recognizes it is the District's responsibility to conserve non-renewable energy and natural resources, to protect our precious environment by reducing energy pollution damage, and to faithfully steward the use of tax payer dollars by preventing waste of energy resources which diverts dollars away from the District's educational mission; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education and Superintendent wish to provide leadership in developing an energy conservation ethic among all district stakeholders by raising awareness of the growing demand for energy and increasing energy supply rates, and will support both short and long-range energy management and conservation strategies in existing facilities, and future school construction; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education and the Superintendent believes that each member of our community has an important part to play in the management of energy consumption and encourages all to participate; and

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS RESOLVED, the Board directs the Superintendent or his/her designee to establish an on-going energy management program. The primary objective of this energy management program will be to raise awareness among all District employees and students to the cost of energy associated with the use of the District's facilities and acquire their active participation in efficient use of energy through continuous education and incentives; and
